Review charitable works at a Management Committee meeting in early 2020.

PROJECTS

Investigate one off projects; for example the zoo barbeque, community clean up projects. Investigate opportunities three times per year.

PUBLIC PROFILE

Getting our charitable contributions and community work recognised in the media, both the formal media and social networking.

Using the skills of W Bro Schenk to set up a plan for the start of 2020.

BUILDINGS

Creating a visually attractive Masonic presence/building

Set a goal of finalizing the future of Masonic buildings in Hamilton.

If one property is the wish of Hamilton based lodges, set a time line to establish the premises.

FUNDING

Ensure any new property must be revenue generating and self-funding. **RECRUITMENT**

Complete the new website, set up the Facebook page and develop a paper prospectus. By December of 2019 have developed a programme for maintaining the website, have costs for a written paper prospectus and an outline on educating members on the use of Facebook

' Masonic Symbolism in the Picturesque Hamilton Gardens.'

A wonderful setting and good profile for Freemasonry.

Our Freemasons Foundation has made a substantial donation as principal supporter to the 'Picturesque Garden' within Hamilton Gardens given its masonic theme - thanks to Mozart and his Magic Flute with masonic symbolism of the rough and perfect ashlars, columns, etc. all couched in an 18th Century garden set along the Waikato River.

Wednesday 13th February was a 'Thank You' evening – it is officially opened later in the year, but it was beautifully decked out, a gathering of 150 people enjoyed the event with musical interludes.

Gardens made in the late 18th century Picturesque tradition also often featured Masonic symbols because of the owners at that time were Masons. Many of these elements have been introduced to the Picturesque Garden at Hamilton Gardens through a series of features that tell the story of the opera 'The Magic Flute.'

The Magic Flute is arguably the best known and loved traditional opera. It was written in 1791 when the Picturesque Garden movement was at its height. Like most influential figures at the time its writers Wolfgang Amedeus Mozart and Emanuel Schikaneder, were both Masons and the story is one of Masonic Initiation as well as being a fantasy fairy tale. Like many great works of art there are many layers of meaning, mostly related to personal improvement; the latter appears to have been a popular theme in that Age of Enlightenment.

Masons in that Age of Enlightenment were usually associated with an educated elite who were changing society. In Europe, this included influential thinkers such as Goethe, Alexander Pope, Francis Bacon, John Locke and Voltaire, architects such as Ingo Jones and Christopher Wren, writers such as Robbie Burns and Mark Twain, composers like Mozart, Hayden and possibly Beethoven, and most prominent members of 'The Royal Society' including well known scientists such as Issac Newton.

Some of these 18th century Masons were plotting changes to traditional rule. They included American revolutionaries like Jefferson, Washington and Benjamin Franklin. Later Lincoln was also a mason.

The Masons of that time associated themselves with the ancient Egyptian masons, hence the pyramids, obelisks, palm trees and sphinxes. They also associated their craft with the Knights Templar, hence the towers, keeps the fortresses. Then there were other historic references like the Greek and Roman Temples, Palladian buildings and artificial Gothic ruins. Other common Masonic symbols were the circular pools, caves, hermit caves, hermitages, obelisks, lions, pelicans, bee hives and serpents.

The garden established in Hamilton Gardens features many Masonic symbols, there 's the Woodland temple, the paving showing the silver moon crescent that frequently occurs in Masonic symbolism. The pavilion faces west where the sun sets and the night starts. Pavillions like this made references to Pantheon and to Palladian architecture that were associated with renaissance masons.

The ceiling of the portico in our pavilion is decorated like many old buildings with stars, in this case the pattern has been taken from the famous stage set for the Magic Flute.

The Queens Throne and the front of the portico are decorated with seven silver stars that have long been an important symbol in Freemasonry and many ancient cultures. Several of the Magic Flute objects are obviously also old Masonic symbols but there are others in this garden if you know where to look. For example, the rough ashlar and the perfect ashlar at the beginning and end of the garden are symbols that are still used and represent man in his primitive and 'civilised' state.

The three kinds of pillar significant to the Masons are represented in this garden. The Doric pillar on the Woodland temple symbolises strength. The lonic pillar holding the magic flute represents wisdom and the Corinthian pillar between the portals represents beauty.

Numbers were also important such as the seven stars on the Queend throne, the use of the 'golden section', the three entrances, three trombones, three veiled ladies and three genii and the eighteen features that tell the story of the Magic Flute, eighteen being the number of seats or sieges.

Even some of the plants have Masonic symbolism. The palm trees represent what were called 'Acacias' which were used in rituals, pomegranates donate abundance and sharing, red roses represent the blood of Christ and white lilies are a symbol of peace.

Everywhere you look in this garden there are old Masonic symbols, this hidden symbolism and its historic associations are a feature that help make these 18th century gardens interesting and distinctive.

Hamilton Gardens Director, Dr Peter Sergel received the 2017 Royal Arch Masonic Centennial Award for overseas travel and research.

This prestigious grant does not have an application process, but rather the committee responsible looks around the country every two years for what they deem will be an overseas study investment that will benefit New Zealand. So while this grant was awarded to an individual, they have essentially recognised the national significance and potential of Hamilton Gardens.

Peter undertook this study trip in May and June 2018 visiting gardens, specialist libraries, museums and universities. One focus of the trip was learning more about the next group of gardens including the: Ancient Egyptian, European Picturesque, German Baroque, Medieval, Roman, English Landscape and French Parterre gardens. This involved trips to Egypt,

England, France, Germany and Austria. He also met a number of garden managers to learn how some of the leading gardens in England, Singapore and America operate and address different issues. Towards the end of the trip, he presented a paper on Hamilton Gardens at an American Public Garden Conference.

'Kitchener of Khartoum ' Mason Extraordinary

Of the many famous men who have been Freemasons, the first Earl Kitchener of Khartoum may be considered to have been the most active to patronise the Craft. In an extraordinary life, his onerous military commitment to his country was intertwined with the Masonic duties he pursued on behalf of the fraternity.



He belonged to 15 Lodges and Chapters whilst serving as District Grand Master of Egypt and the Sudan and of the Punjab in India.

He was simultaneously Commander-in-Chief of the Egyptian Army and later in India, culminating in his appointment as Secretary of War before his untimely death in 1916. At the time he was holding active Masonic office.

Horatio Herbert Kitchener was born on 24 June 1850 near Ballylongford, Kerry, Ireland. Following in his father's footsteps into the army, after varied posts he moved to Egypt in 1882. Freemasonry was well established in the area, having been brought to Egypt in 1798 by Napoleon's armies and quickly spread through the region. From the start, high-ranking French officers were active members, encouraged by Napoleon himself.

They introduced eminent and respected native soldiers and politicians that became the breeding ground for Kitchener to become a Freemason some 50years later. The Masonic legacy in Egypt was confused at best. French, Italian, English, Scottish and Irish jurisdictions worked at times together - and at times at loggerheads. The formation of the National Grand Lodge of Egypt in 1864, warranted by the Grand Orient of Italy, only gave temporary relief to the confusion.

The National Grand Lodge of Egypt was quickly recognised, particularly in the light of the dignitaries who headed it. Soon, however, disillusioned with the many unrecognised Degrees and Orders being practiced by the National Grand Lodge, England decided to form its own District Grand Lodge, which brought some semblance of order and control. Kitchener was 33 when he was initiated, in the Italian-speaking La Concordia Lodge No. 1226 in Cairo in 1883.

The annotation states:

His initiation coincided with the increasing unrest in the Sudan and in 1895 the British government authorised Kitchener to launch a campaign to reconquer the territory. Kitchener became a joining member of the Star of the East Chapter in 1892 (which, founded in 1891, was only erased in 1966). Finally, at a meeting of the Lodge in 1898, the Master, Gerald Maxwell, welcomes Lord Kitchener as 'The Victor of Omdurman'. Kitchener replies: 'It gives me the greatest pleasure to meet the Brethren of the Lodge, which is the first one I have joined in England'.

Meanwhile, Kitchener continued with his vigorous Masonic activities. In 1890 he joined the Greek-speaking Hellas Lodge No. 1105, later named Grecia Lodge, and was instrumental in its revival when it began to work in English. He was Master in 1892.

It was also at this time that his interest in the Orders beyond the Craft began. His standing as a national hero, and his enthusiasm for the Craft, ensured his rapid rise through the Masonic ranks in all the Orders. In 1895 he was appointed Past District Senior Grand Warden for Egypt and the Sudan, and in this capacity he was instrumental in the Foundation of the Fatieh Lodge under the National Grand Lodge of Egypt and was made Honorary Master.

In the Royal Arch he became First Principal of Star of the East Chapter in 1896. In the same year he was appointed Third Grand Principal of the Grand Chapter of Egypt and received the Past rank of Grand Scribe Nehemiah from the Supreme Grand Chapter of England in 1897, the year of his appointment as a Past Grand Warden of the United Grand Lodge of England.

In the Mark Degree, he became Master of the Nubia Mark Lodge No. 511 in 1898. The Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons of England also appointed him Grand Junior Warden of the District of North Africa in the same year. Kitchener was also made an honorary member of Lodge of Edinburgh, St Mary's Chapel No. 1, Scottish Constitution. In November 1899, Viscount Kitchener of Khartoum was appointed Governor-General of the Sudan and the first District Grand Master of Egypt and the Sudan. Under the new re-established jurisdiction, all previous agreements with local Grand Lodges were cancelled and four new Lodges founded. Three were active in Cairo (Bulwer, Grecia and Star of the East) and one in Alexandria (Zetland). Kitchener was involved in all three Cairo Lodges, where he resided.

Lord Kitchener attended the meeting on 23 April 1900 and signed a document, still in possession of the Lodge, proposing that a Royal Resolution be sent to the Prince of Wales concerning the health of Queen Victoria. Lord Roberts is also a signatory to this document. Kitchener's overlapping popularity as a national hero and a dedicated Freemason is reflected on the occasion of his visit to Ipswich on 22 September 1902, just before his posting from South Africa to the Punjab in India. Invited to receive the freedom of the borough, Kitchener also accepted honorary membership in the British Union Lodge No. 114, Province of Suffolk.

In October 1902, Kitchener was posted to India as commander-in-chief of the army, where he remained from 1902 till 1909 and was almost immediately appointed District Grand Master of the Punjab. He began to practise what was by now a familiar pattern of active interest in Masonic affairs. In 1903 he joined Himalayan Brotherhood Lodge No. 459 in Simla. In the same year he became the senior Founder Member of Kitchener Lodge No. 2998, the first of the many Lodges to which he was to give his name. In 1907 he attended a meeting of the namesake of his mother Lodge, Concordia No. 3102, in Calcutta and assisted at the initiation, passing and raising on the same day of His Majesty Habibullah Khan, the Amir of Afghanistan.

With the outbreak of the First World War, Kitchener was called home and the Prime Minister Herbert Asquith appointed him Secretary of State for War, the first time a military man had held the post. In spring 1916, Asquith posted Kitchener to Russia in an attempt to encourage the country to maintain the fight against Germany.

On 5 June 1916, HMS *Hampshire,* on which Kitchener was sailing to Russia, struck a mine off the Orkneys. The British cruiser sank and Kitchener lost his life. It was a sad end to an amazing life.

Bro Field-Marshal Earl Kitchener of Khartoum and Aspall... The Craft mourns the loss of a distinguished Masonic administrator... (and) will ever hold in grateful regard and admiring reverence the fearless soldier and tireless organiser...

Fitting words to a great soldier and a great Freemason.

Jack The Ripper

In researching the Masons' political activities, especially their illegal ones, the infamous "Ripper" murders cannot be overlooked. These serial murders were committed in London in 1888. Over a span of nine weeks, five prostitutes were brutally murdered and their bodies disembowled, sometimes dismembered. These murders were never actually solved, and the murderer was never caught. Letters "signed" under the name



of Jack the Ripper sent to the police force, shortly after these murders were committed, provided the murderer with his nickname. Who the person or people responsible for the murders is or are is still unknown.

Shortly before the time of the murders, the British monarchy was threatened with a great scandal. The eldest son of Queen Victoria, later King Edward VII was the Grand Master of the English Freemasons. Theoretically, his son, Eddy, would have become King if his grandmother and father had died before him, but Eddy had a private life with palace discipline. He was secretly visiting his painter friend Walter Sickert and his friends; and at one of these visits he met and began an affair with Annie Crook, a Catholic shop-girl of the lower classes. After some time she gave birth to his child, and they were secretly married. Sickert hired a nanny for Eddy and Annie's baby girl. Mary (or Marie) Kelly and Sickert were the witnesses at their secret wedding. At the time, Britain was in political turmoil. Had the public learned of Eddy's marriage to a woman like Annie, it could have had far-reaching repercussions, including the abolition of the monarchy. (It was against British law for the monarch to marry a Catholic, not to mention the problems posed by her working-class background.) Such a scandal was a serious threat to anyone with an active interest in When word of all this got to Queen Victoria, she demanded that, Lord Salisbury - her Prime Minister, and a renowned Mason - cover up this affair. Salisbury had Annie admitted to an asylum, where she was to die 32 years later.

Her daughter later became Sickert's mistress and bore him a son. Marie Kelly, the witness at the marriage, became an alcoholic and prostitute and later shared this secret with three of her prostitute friends. When these women threatened to reveal Eddy's secret, Salisbury decided that this threat had to be ended and enlisted the help of Sir William Gull, physician to the Queen and a high-ranking Freemason; it was he who had declared Annie insane and sent her to the asylum.

This is how the shocking "Ripper" murders came about. Prime Minister Salisbury, the other members of government and the police force provided the cover-up, as was expected of the Masonic brotherhood.

They kept this secret and admired Gull for his great sense of "responsibility." Gull sent his driver Netley to persuade Sickert to help locate and identify the four prostitutes. They were located, picked up, brutally murdered, and then their bodies mutilated and dismembered as prescribed in Masonic rites and finally disposed of at the chosen sites.
